

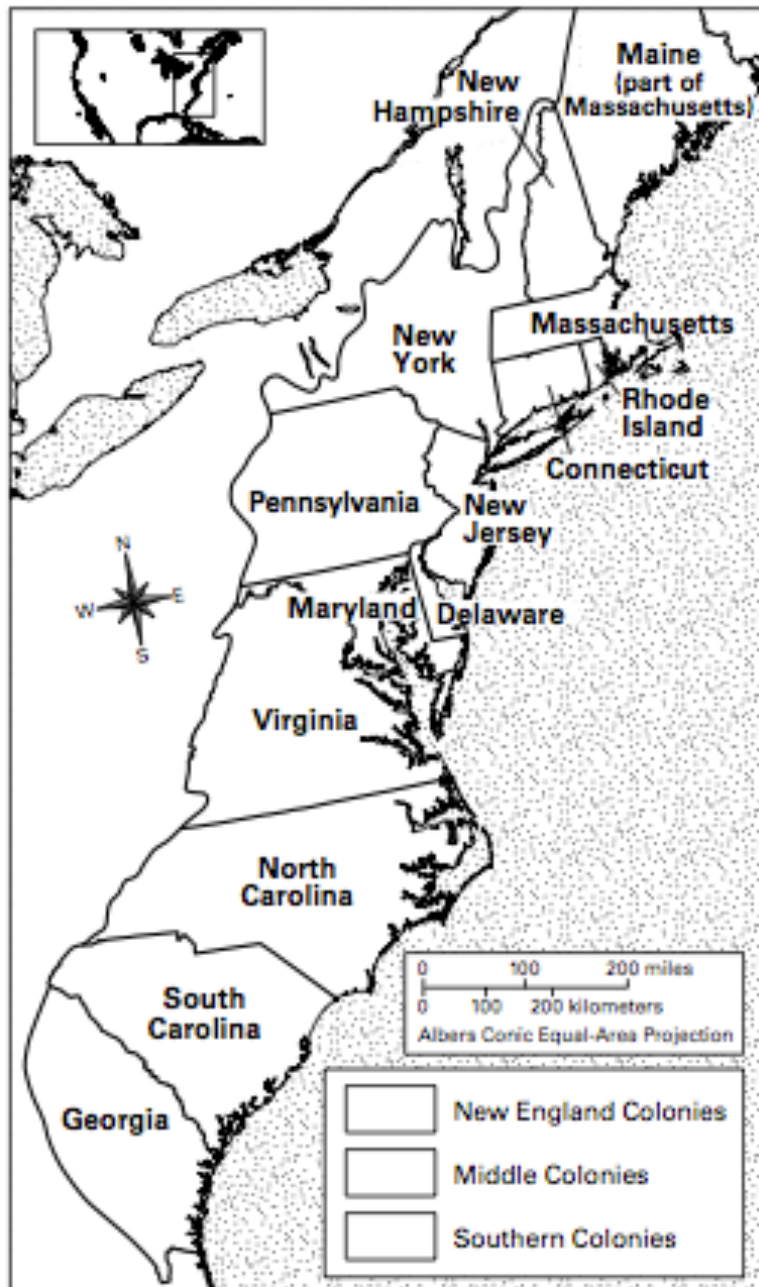

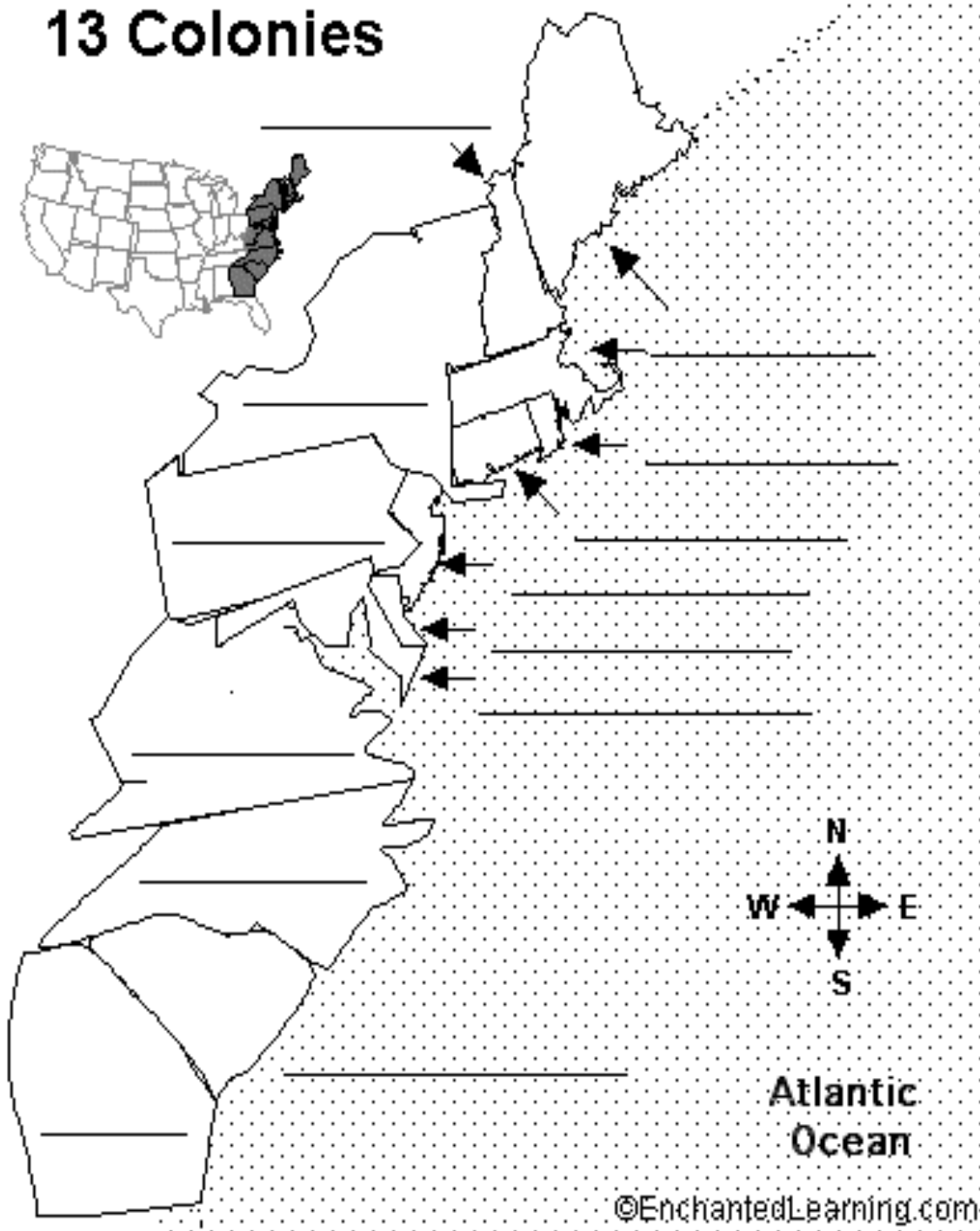

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DAILY DEBRIEF

In our last unit (unit 3: European Exploration) we discussed the arrival of the Spanish in the New World, and their interactions with the Native Americans. This week we will discuss English settlement in the Thirteen Colonies. Keep a critical eye out for who was moving to the colonies and why they were moving there in the first place. What did these settlers hope to achieve? What was life like in the early days of the colonies? These are the questions we will answer this week in our **fourth** unit: Colonization and Settlement.

Vocabulary:

Pilgrim: An English person who landed in Plymouth, Massachusetts to escape religious persecution. Arrived in 1620

Puritan: An English person who colonized New England to escape religious persecution. Arrived in 1629

There are several facts you should know about New England:

- The two colonies in Massachusetts—Plymouth (_____) and the Massachusetts Bay Colony (_____)—came for religious freedom. However, these groups did not tolerate different religions in their colony.
- _____ did not play a major role in business, politics or public life of New England. It was believed that their role was in the home.
- More free blacks lived in _____ than in any other colonies. They had the right to own land, and some even ran their own farms. Prejudice, however, still existed. Slavery still remained _____, but there was not much use for slaves in New England.
- _____ was very important to New England colonist, and it influenced the government and all political decisions.

Quaker: A religious group that promoted tolerance and worked for equal rights for women, African Americans and Native Americans. Quakers settled mainly in Pennsylvania.
